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THE MOST HOLY TRINITY

The Catechism of the Catholic Church says that, "The mystery of the Most Holy Trinity is the central mystery of Christian faith and life. It is the mystery of God in himself." It is therefore the source of all the other mysteries of faith, the light that enlightens them. It is the most fundamental and essential teaching in the "hierarchy of the truths of faith".

Hence, the "revealed truth of the Holy Trinity" is the root of the church' living faith. In response to this "revealed truth" is our faith which binds us all as one community. This is our common deep story. Regardless of where we come from, regardless of our colour, regardless of our gender, regardless of our age, we share the same faith in the Trinitarian God. And this faith is what connects us all. This is the faith that brings us together. This is the faith that forms the community to which we belong.

And as our journey as new parish continues, we need to contemplate on the mysteries of the Most Holy Trinity. Gerald Darring describes the mysteries as, "there is absolute individuality within the Trinity, but there is also absolute equality and absolute unity within the Trinity. Looking at these, we can draw some inspirations for our community. The Trinity is for us the model towards which we strive as a community: free individuals with total equality in complete unity. This is the essence of Christianity.

This is our challenge: to build a community patterned after the Most Holy Trinity. As we go on in our journey as one parish, we need to get in touch with the common deep story that binds us all; that common deep story of faith in Trinitarian God. It is only when we are deeply anchored to this story that we can build a community after the Most Holy Trinity.

THE DOGMA OF THE TRINITY

The Trinity is the term employed to signify the central doctrine of the Christian religion — the truth that in the unity of the Godhead there are Three Persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, these Three Persons being truly distinct one from another.

Thus, in the words of the Athanasian Creed: "the Father is God, the Son is God, and the Holy Spirit is God, and yet there are not three Gods but one God." In this Trinity of Persons, the Son is begotten of the Father by an eternal generation, and the

Holy Spirit proceeds by an eternal procession from the Father and the Son. Yet, notwithstanding this difference as to origin, the Persons are co-eternal and co-equal: all alike are uncreated and omnipotent. This, the Church teaches, is the revelation regarding God's nature which Jesus Christ, the Son of God, came upon earth to deliver to the world: and which she proposes to us as the foundation of her whole dogmatic system.

In Scripture, the Gospel according to Matthew (28:20) explicitly mentions of the trinitarian formula in his great missionary mandate. But the word trias (of which the Latin trinitas is a translation) is first found in Theophilus of Antioch about A.D. 180. He speaks of "the Trinity of God (the Father), His Word and His Wisdom (To Autolycus II.15). In the next century the word is in general use.

TRINITY SUNDAY

The first Sunday after Pentecost was instituted to honour the Most Holy Trinity. In the early Church no special Office or day was assigned for the Holy Trinity. When the Arian heresy was spreading the Fathers prepared an Office with canticles, responses, a Preface, and hymns, to be recited

on Sundays.

During the pontificate of Gregory VII (year 460), Office of the Holy Trinity was recited though he declared the Sunday after Pentecost a Dominica vacans, with no special Office. Alexander II (1061-1073) refused a petition for a special feast on the reason that such a feast was not customary in the Roman Church which dai-

ly honoured the Holy Trinity by the Gloria, Patri, etc., but he did not forbid the celebration where it already existed. John XXII (1316 -1334) ordered the feast for the entire Church on the first Sunday after Pentecost.

The feast ranked as a double of the second class but was raised to the dignity of a primary of the first class, 24 July 1911, by Pius X. Since it was after the first great Pentecost that the doctrine of the Trinity was proclaimed to the world, the feast becomingly follows that of Pentecost.

WHY DO WE... pay stipends to our priests?

A stipend is the income of an ecclesiastical living. In Canon Law, stipend is a general designation of means of support provided for the clergy. In the early ages of the Church, no special provision was made for the maintenance of the clergy. St. Paul, the tent-maker, set the example of earning his own



livelihood. Early legislation, which forbade the clergy to take up certain occupations and professions, is an indication that clerics sought to maintain themselves.

Many of the laity, however, were quick to follow the instructions of Christ and his Apostles, founded on the practice in vogue among the Jews who gave tithes of all their goods and produce for the sustenance of priests and Levites. Thus the laity provided for the bodily welfare of the clergy in return for the spiritual gifts received through their ministry. Contributing to the support of the clergy is one of the Precepts of the Church, obliging the faithful to do so within their means.
