WORLD DAY OF PRAYER AGAINST SLAVERY AND TRAFFICKING OF PEOPLES

This Day of Prayer reminds me of the many stories of migrants who choose to, in Filipino idiom, "hawak sa patalim." It literally means "clutching a knife blade." This phrase is often used when someone is in a hazardous situation but that person choose to live with it.

Most of the stories I heard from Filipinos can be summed: they knew that they have been exploited and abused, but they choose to carry on and suffer. Why? For their family's sake at home. The reason would always be I would rather suffer and be able to send money home for my family rather than speak out against my employers and end up sent home and then my whole family would suffer.

But there are deeper stories than these, more tragic than these, more painful than these when "clutching a knife blade" is not a choice made but the only choice left for them. Across the globe you would hear tragic life stories, which could have been avoided if we treat each person, not as a commodity, but with dignity. "Human trafficking is an open wound on the body of contemporary society" said Pope Francis on his address to participants in the international conference on human trafficking on the 10th April 2014.

This is a challenge for us in our own local community: to fight against the modern forms of slavery and trafficking. We are called to come together and tackle the systemic causes of human trafficking. Together, we can call on the government to commit to long-term support for survivors, including quality education, work permits, access to justice and compensation, and medical and psychosocial assistance.

I am confident that Aotearoa New Zealand, its government and society, is doing its best to prevent trafficking and slavery from happening in our soil. But we need to be vigilant and be watchful for the less-privileged brothers and sisters in our community. They may be smiling at you but they are "clutching the knife blade."

WORLD DAY OF TRAFFICKING AND SLAVERY

On February 8th, Pope Francis joined survivors of human trafficking, religious sisters and cardinals in a day of prayer against modern day slavery, calling for a "courageous economy" with market rules that promote justice and bans human trafficking.

"An economy without human trafficking is an economy with market rules that promote justice, not exclusive special interests," Francis said. "Human trafficking finds fertile ground in the approach of neo-liberal capitalism, in the deregulation of markets aimed at maximizing without ethical limits, without social limits, without environmental limits."

He said this leads to choices being made on the calculation of advantages, often "cleverly obscured by a humanitarian or ecological veneer," but without following an ethical criterion.

"Choices are not made by looking at the human person: people are numbers, to be exploited," the pontiff said in a video message for the VII International Day of Prayer and Reflection against Human Trafficking.

According to the International Labor Organization, human trafficking and modern slavey affect over 40 million people worldwide, with a quarter those enslaved today being children.

An economy without trafficking, Pope Francis said, "is a courageous economy- it takes courage. Not in the sense of recklessness, of risky operations in the hope of easy gains. It requires the courage to combine legitimate profit with the promotion of employment and decent working condition."

"In times of crisis, human trafficking proliferates, as we all know: We see it every day. In times of crisis, human trafficking proliferates; therefore, we need to strengthen an economy that may respond to the crisis in a way that is not short-sighted, in a lasting way, in a solid way," Francis continued.

"An economy that cares for work, creating employment opportunities that do not exploit workers through degrading working conditions and grueling hours," he said. "The COVID pandemic has exacerbated and worsened the conditions of labor exploitation; job losses have penalized many trafficked persons in the process of rehabilitation and social reintegration."

The world day of prayer is coordinated by Talitha Kum, a network of nuns and religious sisters working against trafficking. It was set up by the International Union of Superiors

General (UISG), in partnership with the Migrants and Refugees Section of the Vatican's Dicastery for Service to Integral Human Development, Caritas Internationalis, the Focolare Movement, and other groups.

WHY DO WE ... call Mass a 'sacrifice'?



A sacrifice is a form of adoration during which an authorised priest offers a victim in the name of the people to recognise a) God's supreme dominion and b) our dependence on Him. The victim is at least withdrawn from human use, if not totally immolated. The death of Jesus has always been considered a sacrifice as he died on behalf of mankind to free us from the power of sin. Sacrifice has been a practice among humans for centuries.

The Mass, being a renewal of the sacrifice of Jesus, is indeed a 'sacrifice' in which the faithful are able to offer themselves and their lives along with their crucified Lord. As a sacrifice, the Mass achieves four purposes: 1) to adore God, by acknowledging His supreme dominion over creatures; 2) to be thankful for all God's benefits, hence the term Eucharist; 3) to atone for the sins of the human race, an act of expiation; 4) to beg new favours from God's generosity.
